ANDREW W. PAUL, Deputy Missoula County Attorney, deposes and says that on or about the 31st day of March, 2013, in Missoula County, the Defendant committed the offenses of:

COUNT I: CRIMINAL POSSESSION OF IMITATION DANGEROUS DRUG WITH THE PURPOSE TO DISTRIBUTE, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-9-113(2), punishable by 5 years MSP and a \$50,000 fine; and

COUNT II: CRIMINAL MANUFACTURE OF IMITATION DANGEROUS DRUG, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-9-115(2), punishable by 10 years MSP and a \$100,000 fine.

The facts constituting the offense are:

COUNT I: On or about the 31st day of March, 2013, the above-named Defendant knowingly possessed an imitation dangerous drug with intent to distribute.

COUNT II: On or about the 31st day of March, 2013, the above-named Defendant knowingly or purposely manufactured, prepared or cultivated an imitation dangerous drug.

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On or about the 31st day of March, 2013, at about 1:40 a.m., Deputy Jared Cochran was on patrol near Super Wal-Mart, on Clark Fork Lane when he noticed a male and a female in a small, blue car, parked behind

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the store. Deputy Cochran could see some trash that appeared to have been discarded from the driver's side door. As Cochran approached, he noted that the female appeared to be doing something n her lap. As soon as they noticed Cochran, they immediately began to move as if trying to conceal something in the vehicle, under the seats.

Cochran stopped and approached the driver's side window. The driver, later identified as Joseph Nelson, would only roll down the window a little way. The female, later identified as Tiffany Johnson, averted her eyes and would not make eye contact with Deputy Cochran. Nelson's eyes were red and watery – it appeared that he had a red ring around his eyes. When Nelson reached for his wallet, Cochran noticed that Nelson was seated on a small plastic bottle. Cochran noticed that Nelson had a crystalline substance down the front of his sweatshirt, in the creases. Cochran suspected that Nelson was using methamphetamine and some of the remnants of the drug had fallen on him while he was seated.

Cochran asked Nelson to exit the vehicle. As Nelson was doing so,
Cochran saw that the bottle Nelson was sitting on was Super Glue.

Cochran also noticed two small baggies with a white residue on the floor
board. Cochran asked Nelson about the residue on his sweatshirt. Nelson
immediately began to brush himself off and said that it was salt. When

 asked, Nelson denied sniffing the glue. When further questioned about Nelson's salt claim, Johnson opened the glove compartment and removed a food grade container of what appeared to be sea salt.

Nelson was detained in hand cuffs and advised of his *Miranda* rights.

Nelson said that they packaged the sea salt to appear as if it was a drug.

Nelson said that they prepared it to sell to people who approached them,

looking for something (drugs). Nelson was detained in Deputy Sargent's patrol car.

Cochran then asked Johnson to step out of the vehicle. When she did so, he observed a white crystalline substance in a pile on the passenger floor. Also on the floor was a backpack and vehicle visor mirror. On the dash was a pocket knife with blade open and the end of the blade was covered with a white substance. Next to the knife was a lighter.

Johnson said that they were homeless and that they were mixing the sea salt with Super Glue to form a substance that looked like methamphetamine. Johnson said that the glue gave it a flavor more consistent with methamphetamine. Johnson admitted that they had been selling the imitation methamphetamine in any quantity that the could for whatever price they could obtain.
