COMPLAINT

JENNIFER CLARK, Deputy Missoula County Attorney, deposes and says that on or about the 29th day of March and the 1st day of April, 2013, in Missoula County, the Defendant committed the offenses of:

COUNT I: ASSAULT WITH WEAPON, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-5-213, punishable by 20 years MSP and a \$50,000 fine;

COUNT II: CRIMINAL DESTRUCTION OF OR TAMPERING WITH A COMMUNICATION DEVICE, a Misdemeanor, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-6-105, punishable by 6 months MCDF and a \$1000 fine;

COUNT III: AGGRAVATED KIDNAPPING, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-5-303, punishable by Death, Life Imprisonment or 2-100 years MSP and a \$50,000 fine; and

COUNT IV: AGGRAVATED ASSAULT, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-5-202, punishable by not to exceed 20 years MSP and a \$50,000 fine.

The facts constituting the offense are:

COUNT I: On or about the 29th day of March, 2013, the above-named Defendant purposely or knowingly caused reasonable apprehension of serious bodily injury in Amber Drugge by use of a weapon, a large knife.

COUNT II: On or about the 29th day of March, 2013, the above-named Defendant purposely or knowingly destroyed or tampered with a telephone to obstruct, prevent, or interfere with the report to any law enforcement agency of any actual criminal offense, to wit: Defendant destroyed a phone being used by Amber Drugge to call 9-1-1 to report an assault.

COUNT III: On or about the 1st day of April, 2013, the above-named Defendant knowingly or purposely, and without lawful authority, restrained Malarie Radabaugh by holding her in a place of isolation and/or threatening to use physical force for the purpose of holding her for ransom or reward and/or inflicting bodily injury on or to terrorize her.

COUNT IV: On or about the 1st day of April, 2013, the above-named

Defendant purposely or knowingly caused, with the use of physical force or

contact, a reasonable apprehension of serious bodily injury to Malarie Radabaugh by strangling her to point of unconsciousness.

14	JENNIFER CLARK, Deputy County Attorney of Missoula County,		
15 16	Montana, being first duly sworn upon oath, deposes and says:		
17	I have read the official law enforcement reports regarding the		
18 19	investigation of JOEL VINCENT MCCONNELL for allegedly committing the		
20	offense(s) set forth in the complaint in and based upon the information		
21	contained in the reports, if true, believe probable cause exists to justify		
22	charging the above-named defendant as specified in the accompanying		
24	complaint.		
25 26	On or about the 29th day of March, 2013, Missoula City Police Officer		
27	Long responded to Safeway on Broadway to meet with Amber Drugge		
28	regarding her report that Joel McConn	nell threatened her with a knife. When	

Officer Long arrived on scene he observed that Drugge was in a wheelchair. She said that her leg was broken and that she had recently had surgery on that leg. Drugge reported that she currently resides at a motel in Missoula. McConnell was also staying at the same motel.

At about 6:30 p.m., Drugge encountered McConnell in the motel parking lot. She confronted him about some money he owed her.

McConnell became upset, got in Drugge's face and then kicked her broken leg. As he walked away, Drugge said, "You won't get away with this."

McConnell came back to Drugge, pulled a large knife out of his back pocket and put it up to Drugge's throat, touching the skin of her neck. McConnell said, "You better watch it or I'm gonna kill you."

McConnell then turned to Drugge's husband, Daniel Helton, held the knife up to his throat and said, "You need to keep your bitch in line."

McConnell then returned to his room. Drugge described the knife as being approximately 8 inches long with a serrated edge on one side.

Drugge then proceeded to her room to call 9-1-1. As she was speaking with the 9-1-1 operator, McConnell left his room and got in a car. He held the knife up to show it to Drugge. Drugge blew him a kiss. This seemed to upset McConnell. He got out of his car, approached Drugge,

pushed her, grabbed the phone she had been using and smashed it on the ground. He then left in his car.

When asked if she thought McConnell was going to use the knife to hurt her, she said, 'Yes." Helton agreed. Drugge said that she was scared to go back to the motel. Drugge was visibly shaken and constantly looking around.

On April 1, 2013, at about 1:07 p.m., Missoula City Police Officer Pat Erbacher responded to a different motel to speak with a female named Malarie Radabaugh. Upon arrival he saw two females and a male sitting in and around a mini-van. Officer Horton took Radabaugh aside to speak with her while Erbacher spoke with Cheyenne, Christopher then Elizabeth (who had come out of the motel shortly after Erbacher arrived).

Malarie told Horton that at about 1 a.m. she met Joel McConnell at her motel. She later admitted that she wanted to get methamphetamine from him, as she had on multiple other occasions. Malarie said that she had stolen \$200 from McConnell a couple days earlier. She believed McConnell was coming by looking for his money.

She got into McConnell's vehicle, a white Chevy Malibu and he began driving around. McConnell then started to threaten Malarie, telling her, "I am going to kill you. You're going to get your ass kicked. I am going to feed

to feed your body to the pigs. I am going to kill and rape your kids."

Malarie was scared he really was going to kill her and harm her kids. She said that she had never been so scared. She started crying and couldn't stop. McConnell kept saying, "You better get my money, you fucking bitch." Malarie said that two cars drove up behind them and McConnell said, "Now, you're going to get your ass beat." Malarie pleaded with McConnell and promised him that she'd get the money.

While they were driving back to McConnell's motel room, Malarie tried to jump out of the car. McConnell grabbed her hair, pulled her back inside the car and strangled her until she passed out. McConnell then drove them back to his motel room. McConnell told Malarie that she was going to stay in the room until she paid her debt. McConnell tried to tie her up but she was able to fend him off. McConnell put duct tape over her mouth. McConnell threatened to slash Malarie's throat. There were several knives in the room.

Malarie reported that there were two other people in the room:

Sharon Kuhn and a male she only knew as "Stolle." Kuhn and Stolle would take turns sitting in a chair between Malarie and the door to prevent her from leaving. They were using methamphetamine. McConnell gave

Malarie one hit of methamphetamine so that she wouldn't get sick. At one

point, McConnell left her with Kuhn and Stolle so that he could "go make a run."

When he returned, he held his phone up to her ear and she heard a male tell her that she better pay up because if she didn't he had some bikers who were willing to pay \$1,200 to "run a train on her."

After some time, Malarie fell asleep. When she woke up, Kuhn indicated that she needed to get to work. McConnell took Malarie with him to drive Kuhn to work. After Kuhn was dropped off, Malarie convinced McConnell to take her to her motel so that she could pick up a few personal items. When McConnell pulled up to the motel, Malarie got out of the vehicle and located several of her friends. She told them what happened and they confronted McConnell, who was waiting in his vehicle in the motel parking lot. McConnell sped away.

Officers responded to McConnell's motel room where they located McConnell. Officer Horton advised McConnell of his Miranda rights and McConnell agreed to speak with Horton. McConnell admitted that he picked up Malarie at 1 a.m. However, he claimed that he was there to protect her from someone else. He said that Malarie was hysterical and freaked out on drugs. She tried to jump out of his car and he had to physically restrain her. Back at his motel room, he said that they talked all

 night. In the morning, after he dropped off Kuhn, he took Malarie to her motel. Malarie got out and approached two people in the parking lot. A few minutes later the two individuals started to approach him, saying: "So, you're going to kill her?" McConnell said that he quickly drove out of the parking lot and returned to his motel room.

McConnell was arrested and transported to the police station.

Detective Geoff Curtis applied for and was granted a search warrant for McConnell's motel room and vehicle. During the service of the search warrant, Curtis observed both Kuhn and Stolle on scene in another vehicle. Curtis provided Kuhn with a copy of the warrant.

During a search of the Chevy Malibu, Curtis located a large knife in a sleeve. Later he saw Amber Drugge and asked her if this was the same knife McConnell used to threaten her. When Curtis removed the sleeve, Drugge's eyes widened and she said she was 100% sure the knife was the same one McConnell held to her throat. Inside the room, officers located a roll of duct tape, an air soft pistol, snort tube, blue-colored rope or bungee cord and other miscellaneous items.

Curtis then asked Kuhn and Stolle to meet him at the police station.

They arrived at the police station and Curtis interviewed them separately.

At first, Kuhn said that nothing happened and that McConnell didn't do

anything wrong. Later, she claimed that they were trying to "scare her straight." Kuhn admitted that Stolle came over and sat in the room with them. Kuhn said that at one point she walked out of the bathroom and McConnell was down at face level with Malarie and McConnell had his phone in his hand. Kuhn reported that McConnell told Malarie that she didn't want to mess with these people. Kuhn admitted that she believes it is reasonable for Malarie to have felt that she could not leave the room.

Kuhn said that they were trying to keep her in the room but only to help her get off drugs. Later she admitted that McConnell loaded a pipe and supplied Malarie with methamphetamine.

Curtis then spoke with Stolle. Stolle said that McConnell called him and told him to come over right away. Stolle arrived at the motel room and McConnell told Stolle to watch Malarie and to not let her do anything stupid. McConnell told him not to let anyone in the room. Stolle learned that Malarie had stolen methamphetamine from McConnell on several occasions and that she owed McConnell money. Stolle understood that McConnell was trying to collect this drug debt. Stolle admitted that he sat in a chair between Malarie and the door. He claimed he would have let her go, if she tried to leave. However, given her smaller size it would be reasonable for her to believe that she was trapped in the room.

Stolle showed Curtis text messages between himself and Kuhn. Stolle received a text from Kuhn that stated: "did you get the rope out of there too" and Stolle replied "Joel packed" and then "Im scared." Stolle said that McConnell removed items prior to police arriving at his room.

Curtis read the elements of Kidnapping to Stolle and he agreed that is what McConnell, Kuhn and he did to Malarie. Stolle expressed remorse for what had happened.

Curtis then re-interviewed Kuhn. She admitted that McConnell had duct tape and rope on the bed and that he had threatened to tie Malarie up. Kuhn said that she didn't want McConnell to get in trouble and that this was very hard for her.
