COMPLAINT

Mac Bloom, Deputy County Attorney, deposes and says that on or about the 10th day of October, 2015, in Missoula County, the Defendant committed the offenses of COUNT I: AGGRAVATED BURGLARY, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-6-204(2), punishable by 40 years MSP and/or \$50,000 fine; COUNT II: CRIMINAL MISCHIEF, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-6-101(1)[2], punishable by 10 years MSP and/or \$50,000 fine; COUNT III: ASSAULT WITH WEAPON, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-5-213, punishable by 20 years MSP and/or \$50,000 fine; COUNT IV: DISORDERLY CONDUCT, a Misdemeanor, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-8-101(2), punishable by 10 days MCDF and/or \$100 fine.

The facts constituting the offense are:

COUNT I: On or about the 10th day of October, 2015, the above-named

Defendant knowingly entered or remained unlawfully in an occupied structure with the
purpose to commit an offense therein and in effecting entry or in the course of
committing the offense or in immediate flight thereafter, the Defendant purposely,

knowingly, or negligently inflicted or attempted to inflict bodily injury upon Sheryl Taylor and/or Angela Mitchell.

COUNT II: On or about the 10th day of October, 2015, the above-named Defendant committed the offense of criminal mischief by knowingly or purposely injuring, damaging, or destroying the property another without consent. The value of the property exceeds \$1500.

COUNT III: On or about the 10th day of October, 2015, the above-named Defendant purposely or knowingly caused reasonable apprehension of serious bodily injury in Sheryl Taylor by use of a weapon or what reasonably appeared to be a weapon, to wit: a knife.

COUNT IV: On or about the 10th day of October, 2015, the above-named

Defendant knowingly disturbed the peace by yelling profanities and/or issuing threats.

AFFIDAVIT OF PROBABLE CAUSE

Mac Bloom, Deputy County Attorney, being first duly sworn upon oath, deposes and says:

I have read the official law enforcement reports regarding the investigation of BENJAMIN M SNAVELY for allegedly committing the offense(s) set forth in the complaint and based upon the information contained in the reports, if true, believe probable cause exists to justify charging the above-named defendant as specified in the accompanying complaint.

On or about the 10th day of October, 2015, Officers O'Dell and Colyer, Missoula City Police Department, responded to a residence regarding five separate reports of a physical disturbance. Upon arrival, Officer O'Dell was informed by a neighbor that a male was "trashing" an apartment. Officer O'Dell observed a sobbing female, later identified as Sheryl Taylor, standing in an adjacent alley with several other people. At this point, another female, later identified as Angela Mitchell, ran out of the apartment screaming, "He attacked me." Her face was red and her eyes were squinted closed. She stated that she had been hit with pepper spray.

Officer O'Dell then walked to the open door of the apartment and announced himself. A male who identified himself as Benjamin Snavely (Defendant) answered and began rambling about drugs. Officer O'Dell entered and noticed that the apartment was in shambles. Almost all of the property in the living room was damaged and the floor was covered with broken furniture, glass, and other items. He noted that the apartment looked as though it had been struck by a tornado. At this time, Defendant was standing in the bathroom, actively kicking the wall. Officers O'Dell and Colyer grabbed him and placed him in handcuffs. Defendant's face was red and he smelled strongly of pepper spray. The Officers escorted Defendant out of the residence and instructed him to sit in front of a patrol vehicle.

Officer Mulligan, Missoula City Police Department, arrived on scene and noted the extensive damage to the apartment. He observed that the door frame was splintered and appeared to have been kicked in. He also noticed a large hole in the bathroom wall. He exited the apartment and spoke with Taylor about what had transpired. Taylor was visibly shaking and had difficulty explaining what happened. She eventually told Officer Mulligan that she had been in her bedroom when she heard a loud pounding at the door. Before she could figure out what was going on, Defendant rushed into her bedroom and threw her to the ground multiple times. When asked to further describe this process, Taylor stated that she could not do so because it was too traumatic.

Several other witnesses, Suzanne Holy, Ryan Holy, and Linsey Kucherry, reported seeing Defendant running towards the side entrance of Taylor's apartment and pounding on the door after being involved in a brief physical scuffle with an unidentified male. Yet another witness, Michelle Montgomery, observed Defendant smash out Taylor's bedroom

window with his elbow. Montgomery could hear Talyor inside the apartment yelling, "Help, me. Help me." Montgomery informed Defendant that she was calling 911.

Defendant responded, "Stay out of this you [expletive]." He then yelled, "I'm going to burn the house down" and "I'm going to kill you."

Officer Mulligan later spoke with Taylor a second time. Taylor stated that she now remembered that Defendant entered her bedroom with a large kitchen knife. Taylor took Officer Mulligan into the apartment and showed him a broken knife blade between her bed and the window. She explained that at some point during the assault, Defendant was holding the knife in a downward fashion approximately three feet away from her. She demonstrated to Officer Mulligan that Defendant had been holding the knife at head level. She also stated that when Defendant entered her bedroom, he closed and locked the door before throwing her against the closet door. Officer Mulligan observed that the closet door had been dislodged from its tracks. Taylor stated that she believed Defendant was going to kill her. She eventually managed to unlock the door and flee the apartment. Taylor also mentioned that she and Defendant had been involved in an on-again off-again relationship.

Officer Colyer interviewed Mitchell about the incident. Mitchell stated that she had been hanging out with Taylor in the apartment and got up to use the restroom. While there, she heard a loud crash and a man say, "Alright ladies." She then locked the bathroom door and hid in the shower. She could hear screaming and breaking glass outside. Sometime later, Defendant began kicking in the restroom door. He entered and observed Mitchell in the shower. Mitchell reacted to Defendant's presence by spraying him with pepper spray. Defendant then grabbed her by the shoulders and said, "You're

dead." He also struck Mitchell with a closed fist. The pepper spray eventually took effect and Mitchell escaped. Mitchell was later transported to the hospital to obtain treatment for pepper spray burns and multiple cuts to her feet from the struggle and flight thereafter.

Medical personnel eventually arrived and treated Defendant. While he was being treated, Defendant mentioned that he had committed murder and was "guilty." Defendant also admitted to "breaking up the house and harassing women." Defendant's father later approached the scene and asked Defendant whether he was "back on meth." Defendant responded, "Yeah Dad, what do you [expletive] think?" Defendant continued to shout profanities until he was placed in the back of the patrol car and transported to jail. The value of the property damaged by Defendant exceeds \$1500.
