Dear Mr. President:

Under the provisions of Section 401 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207 (Stafford Act), as implemented by 44 CFR § 206.36, I request that you declare a Major Disaster for the State of New Jersey applicable to the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean as a result of the damages caused by a severe storm (Nor'Easter as defined by the National Weather Service) from October 1, 2015 through October 4, 2015.

This coastal storm front stalled off the Mid-Atlantic coast and battered the State of New Jersey from October 1, 2015 through October 4, 2015. The rain, waves, and sustained winds of up to 50 miles per hour caused severe coastal flooding and extensive damage to the State's coastal barrier dune system in the impacted areas. The storm severely damaged or destroyed dunes, dune grass, fencing and crossovers as well as caused beach erosion. The damage to these protective coastal barrier systems has caused erosion to the point where a five year storm will damage improved property. The State will also be at risk of additional flooding due to these damages as we get closer to the winter season and increased threat of additional storms. In addition, sand removal from roads, streets, drains and other public property was required in order to restore traffic flow and prevent further flooding. Wind damage also caused downed trees.

The State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) was activated from October 1 through October 3, 2015 to monitor and coordinate resource requests and response and recovery efforts and the State Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) was executed. State Emergency Support Functions (ESF) 1 (Transportation), ESF-2 (Communications), ESF-3 (Public Works and Engineering), ESF-5 (Emergency Management), ESF-6 (Mass Care), ESF-7 (Resource Support), ESF-8 (Health), ESF-9 Urban Search and Rescue, ESF-10 Hazardous Materials, ESF-11 (Agriculture), ESF-12 (Energy), ESF-13 (Public Safety), and ESF-15 (External Affairs) monitored the response effort to assist affected municipalities and counties. County Emergency Operations Centers in Cape May and Ocean Counties were also activated. In addition, I declared a State of Emergency on October 1, 2015.

On October 14, 2015, the State requested assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to conduct a joint preliminary damage assessment (PDA) in the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean. In preparation for the joint PDA, the State completed a review of the damage estimates through the NJOEM Public Assistance Unit, which is comprised of individuals who have extensive experience and training in estimating damages within the FEMA Public Assistance program. NJOEM also partnered with the State's Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) Bureau of Coastal Engineering (BCE) to pinpoint which coastal areas are covered by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). The joint PDA occurred on October 26-27, 2015. Counties and municipalities were able to provide better data compared to immediate estimates by conducting the PDA process three weeks after the storm. The final PDA determined that State, county and local property in the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean suffered significant damages as tabulated in Enclosures B and C. NJOEM provided FEMA Region II with supporting documentation for all completed Category A, B and G work, and documentation on the engineered beaches as required under Disaster Assistance Fact Sheet 9580.8 Eligible Sand Replacement on Public Beaches.

Based on the above, I have determined that this incident is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the State and the affected county and local governments, and that federal assistance is necessary to supplement the efforts and available resources of the State, county and local governments, and disaster relief organizations. I am requesting Public Assistance for the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean. I am also requesting Hazard Mitigation Assistance state-wide. The State developed a Hazard Mitigation Plan that was approved by FEMA in August 2014. The estimates, types, and amounts of assistance needed under the Stafford Act are tabulated in Enclosures B and C.

I certify that, for this disaster, the State and local governments will assume all applicable non-federal shares of costs required by the Stafford Act. Total expenditures are estimated to exceed the statewide per capita threshold. The counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean exceeded their respective county per capita thresholds as tabulated in Enclosure B. The total costs are estimated to exceed \$32,000,000.

In addition, pursuant to Sections 403 and 407 of the Stafford Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5170b & 5173 regarding debris removal, the State agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the United States for any claims arising from the removal of debris or wreckage for this disaster. The State agrees that

debris removal from public and private property will not occur until the landowner signs an unconditional authorization for the removal of debris.

I have designated Captain Tristin Collins of the New Jersey State Police, Office of Emergency Management, as the Governor's Authorized Representative and State Coordinating Officer for this request. Captain Collins will work in conjunction with FEMA and will provide information or justification on my behalf when necessary.

This storm has put a severe strain on State, county, and local resources and budgets. On July 22, 2015 you declared a Major Disaster for New Jersey affecting the counties of Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, and Gloucester for Public Assistance (DR-4231). For the reasons detailed above, I respectfully request a Major Disaster Declaration for the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean to provide Public Assistance in Categories A, B, E, F and G.

The storm severely impacted the Southern Coastal Region of the State, specifically the counties of Cape May, Monmouth, and Ocean, causing roadway and infrastructure damage, and extensive dune and beach erosion beyond the five year flood protection criterion. The damages are estimated at \$32 million. State, county and local law enforcement as well as public works agencies activated throughout the region to protect lives, public health and safety, and improved property. This incident is of such severity and magnitude that effective response is beyond the capabilities of the State and the affected county and local governments. Federal assistance is necessary to supplement the efforts and available resources of State, county, and local governments, and disaster relief organizations. 9.
