KARLA PAINTER, Deputy County Attorney, deposes and says that from approximately April 2015 to June 2015 in Missoula County, the Defendant committed the offense of COUNT I: ISSUING A BAD CHECK, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-6-316(3), punishable by 10 years MSP and/or \$50,000 fine.

COUNT I: From approximately April 2015 to June 2015 the above-named Defendant committed the offense of issuing a bad check when he issued or delivered a check or other order upon a real or fictitious depository for the payment of money knowing that it would not be paid by the depository. The checks were issued or delivered as part of a common scheme.

AFFIDAVIT OF PROBABLE CAUSE

KARLA PAINTER, Deputy County Attorney, Montana, being first duly sworn upon oath, deposes and says:

I have read the official law enforcement reports regarding the investigation of KEITH JAMES JESSOP for allegedly committing the offense(s) set forth in the complaint and based upon the information contained in the reports, if true, believe probable cause exists to justify charging the above-named defendant as specified in the accompanying complaint.

On or about June 16, 2015, Officer Horton of the Missoula Police Department responded to Bob Wards for a reported theft. Upon arrival he spoke with employee Allen Cain whom stated a male came into the store on May 22, 2015 and wrote a check in the amount of \$1161.89 for a cart full of merchandise. The cashier identified the male with his driver's license as Keith Jessop. Jessop then left the store only to return a few hours later and ask to exchange a few of the items her purchased for cash. Cain informed Jessop he couldn't exchange the items for cash until the check cleared in approximately six days. Cain told Jessop he was welcome to bring all of the items back and they would give him

the check. Jessop responded that he wanted to keep some of the items and left the store.

Cain and another employee, Jake Childress, then became suspicious of Jessop's behavior believing he may be trying to scam them.

A few days later Jessop returned to the store and filled up another cart with merchandise valuing approximately \$3000. Childress was working and remembered Jessop from the previous encounter. As Jessop proceeded with the transaction he started to fill out a check for the merchandise. Childress stopped him, informing Jessop they were not going to take a check until they verified the funds through his bank. Jessop then stated "never mind" and left the store.

Officer Horton also responded to Sportsman's Warehouse for a report of another bad check purchase on June 16. Employee Aaron Olsen stated that on May 21, 2015 a male used a check to pay for \$2051.95 worth of merchandise. The cashier utilized the male's driver's license and identified him as Keith Jessop. Days later, Sportsman's Warehouse received a letter from Action Collection Service informing them the checking account Jessop used had been closed.

A representative from Cabela's informed Olsen that Jessop had just been in their store approximately 30 minutes earlier trying to purchase items with a check. The store refused to complete the transaction after they called the bank and verified Jessop's account was closed. Cabela's sent an email to Sportsman's Warehouse with a photograph of Jessop and the vehicle he was driving: a silver Chevrolet truck.

Officer Horton responded to Cabela's and spoke with Loss Prevention Officer Mike Patterson. Patterson reported that on May 20, 2015, a male used a check to purchase \$1454.97 in merchandise. The cashier obtained his driver's license and

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 identified the male as Keith Jessop. A few days later, Patterson received a letter informing him the account from which Jessop issued the check had been closed. Patterson said that Jessop returned on May 27, 2015 and tried to purchase \$4872.00 worth of products using a check. Patterson advised Jessop he would need to verify the check was valid before completing the purchase. Jessop then stated "never mind" and left the store. On June 16, 2015, Jessop again returned to the store and attempted to purchase \$1791.00 worth of merchandise with a check. Again Patterson refused his purchase.

Costco also received, and honored, bad checks from Keith Jessop on May 20, 2015 for \$2,260.98, May 26, 2015 for \$1,524.13, and on May 27, 2015 for \$2,630.27. Officers later located Horton at Lucky Lil's on North Reserve and arrested him.

On June 17, 2015, Detective Stacy Lear conducted a recorded interview with Jessop at the jail. Jessop admitted he had a methamphetamine addiction and was passing bad checks to support his substance abuse. Jessop stated he began by writing checks off of his closed US Bank account until he ran out of checks. Next, he opened new accounts at various banks with the minimum deposit then withdrew the funds until only \$20 or \$40 remained in the account. Jessop subsequently passed as many checks for as much merchandise as he could. Jessop would either return the goods to the stores for cash, or sell them to other individuals for money. Jessop stated he knew the checks would not be covered by the amounts remaining in the account. Jessop admitted to opening accounts at Stockman's Bank, Wells Fargo, First Interstate, and First Montana Credit Union. In addition to the businesses above, Jessop confessed to providing bad checks to the following business: Hastings, Wal Mart, Shopko, Quality

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Supply, Mountain West Coop, Fast Trip, Firestone, Magic Diamond, Montana Lìl's, Lucky Lil's, Albertsons, Safeway, CVS, Little Caesars, Ole's and Ace Hardware. While Jessop provided some descriptions of items, he could not recall the exact purchases or amounts from each location.

Jessop consented to a search of his vehicle and his hotel room where officers recovered some of the stolen items as well as drug paraphernalia including glass tubes and a scale. This investigation is ongoing, but preliminary reports indicate the total amount of goods, services, and cash Jessop obtained from the bad checks is will over \$10,000.
