COMPLAINT

JASON MARKS, Chief Deputy County Attorney, deposes and says that on or about the 12th day of April, 2017, in Missoula County, the Defendant committed the offense of COUNT I: ATTEMPTED DELIBERATE HOMICIDE, a Felony, in violation of Montana law, namely: Mont. Code Ann. 45-5-102[1] and 45-4-103, punishable life imprisonment, or not less than 10 or more than 100 years MSP.

The facts constituting the offense are:

COUNT I: On or about the 12th day of April, 2017, the above-named Defendant, with the purpose to commit the offense of deliberate homicide be committed, fired a .45 caliber pistol at Leah Morton.

AFFIDAVIT OF PROBABLE CAUSE

JASON MARKS, Chief Deputy County Attorney, Montana, being first duly sworn upon oath, deposes and says:

I have read the official law enforcement reports regarding the investigation of IAN JAMES FIORINO for allegedly committing the offense(s) set forth in the complaint and based upon the information contained in the reports, if true, believe probable cause exists to justify charging the above-named defendant as specified in the accompanying complaint.

On or about the 12th day of April, 2017, Missoula City Police responded to calls of a shot fired at the Corso Apartments in the area of 1665 Milwaukee Way in Missoula.

Upon arrival officers found a spent .45 caliber shell casing in the parking lot as well as silver paint flecks.

Officers obtained surveillance video from the apartment building which documented the shooting and interviewed witnesses. They learned that the occupants of two vehicles in the parking lot, subsequently determined to be a blue Hyundai Elantra and a silver Dodge Caliber, had been in a verbal dispute. A male with a bandana over his face who had arrived in another vehicle that was described as a "burnt orange" color passenger car, subsequently determined to be a Subaru Impreza, approached with a gun behind his back. He fired one shot at the silver Dodge which then sped away. All of the vehicles involved had left the scene prior to police arriving.

Law enforcement located the silver Dodge at a hotel on Airway Blvd in Missoula. It had a gouge on the driver's side passenger door, slightly below the window, which was consistent with a bullet strike. Police made contact with the Leah Morton at the hotel and she agreed to be interviewed by detectives.

Morton told detectives that a few days prior to April 12, 2017, she had arranged to buy methamphetamine but had instead stolen it. She identified the person she had stolen it from as {L.M.}, age 17. She said on April 12th an unknown man in a blue passenger car started following her and ramming her vehicle, the silver Dodge Caliber. Detectives later determined that the male was Cory Kendall with {L.M.} as his passenger. Morton called a friend for assistance and stopped in the parking area of the Corso Apartments. She said she was confronting the occupants of the blue car when an unknown male walked up with a handgun. He fired one round at her after she was back in her car and she fled.

 Detectives interviewed Cory Kendall who admitted being the driver of the blue car involved. He told varying accounts of what happened but said that he knew there was a dispute over stolen property. He denied knowing who the male was that arrived and fired the shot. A search was conducted of Kendall's car which revealed, among other things, a cell phone. A search of the call log on the phone showed a call shortly before the shooting to Jennifer Hall. There was another call made to Jennifer Hall's number shortly after the shooting.

In an unrelated DUI investigation, a Montana Highway Patrol trooper made contact with Jennifer Hall on April 15, 2017. She was driving a rust colored Subaru Impreza and Ian Fiorino was a passenger. The trooper noted a holster and an unfired .45 caliber cartridge were in the car. Upon learning of this encounter, Detective Stonesifer compared the witness descriptions of the shooter with the information on Fiorino's driver's license and determined that Fiorino's age, height, weight, and hair color, were generally consistent with the description of the shooter.

On April 20, 2017, detectives interviewed Jennifer Hall after she was located by patrol officers. She admitted that the orange passenger car in the surveillance footage of the shooting was her car. She said that prior to the shooting Ian Fiorino was the one driving her car. She said that {L.M.} called her phone and said that they had "found somebody they were looking for" and needed "backup." She and Fiorino went to the location and Firoino got out with the bandana over his face. He had her get into the driver's seat and drive. She described a black handgun in his possession. She said she did not actually see the shooting. After the shooting she took Fiorino to a hotel where he had been staying. Detectives found what appeared to be illegal drugs, men's

clothing, and a hotel receipt in Fiorino's name in a search of Hall's car following her interview.
